BRIDGET CHÉRIE HARPER

Unbound

Bridget Chérie Harper follows in the footsteps of ancient Roman and Greek sculptors who molded classic figures with missing limbs and appendages into works of art. This Arizona artist takes the concept even further by using her porcelain sculptures as blank canvasses on which she depicts surrealistic imagery using china paint.

“I’m creating a sensual canvas using

the female form,” says Harper.

Such sensuality brings continuity to Harper’s work, which will be featured in a solo exhibition titled *Unbound* at Paul Scott Gallery in Scottsdale.

Because Harper builds each sculpture and makes her own porcelain, each one-of-a-kind piece involves a time-consuming process that can take up to six weeks to complete. Working in layers, she adds

a richness and depth seldom seen in contemporary sculpture. Each painting has its own concept inspired by the artist’s dreams, relationships and everyday encounters.

“The paintings I create on the classical form are a by-product of my life. Conceptually, they’re so distinct,” says Harper. “So much of myself goes into these paintings. When I look at one,

I know what I was thinking or feeling or what I saw that was interesting.”

Within Harper’s work viewers will notice two things occurring on many levels simultaneously: the relationship between the painting on the sculpture and within the painting itself.

Working with classical figures hasn’t stopped Harper from incorporating 21st century technology into her work. She is now creating mirrored images using computer-aided design (CAD), which allows her to make changes and

manipulate the sculpture much faster.

Collectors of Harper’s work often comment on the visible growth from piece to piece. In addition to technical improvements and sophistication, the artist hopes viewers notice the elegance, harmony and tension that are created between the sculpture and the painting, and the individualism of each.

“Each sculpture has its own distinctive character. I want the collector to experience the piece in his or her own way,” she says. “It definitely has a reaction.” ●
